for a Position as Research Associate (post doc)
for the 'Principles for a Data Economy' project
(funded by the Fritz Thyssen Foundation)

At the Institute for Civil Law/Institute for Innovation and Digitisation in Law of the University of Vienna, a position as Research Associate (post doc) is to be filled at the earliest possible date. The contract will be for an initial period of two years. The position is part of the 'Principles for a Data Economy' project, which is conducted as a joint endeavour of the American Law Institute (ALI) and the European Law Institute (ELI) and is funded by the Fritz Thyssen Foundation.

The Research Associate will be expected to execute the following tasks:

- Conduct comprehensive legal research on data law in Europe
- Correspond with the respective secretariats and the leadership of the ALI and the ELI as well as with the members of the two Advisory Committees
- Correspond with other agencies and cooperation partners
- Cater to project-related public relations
- Consolidate the draft document and incorporate proposed changes
- Plan and coordinate project meetings and events (eg public workshops)
- Financially administer third-party funded project

All work is done in English. The Research Associate will draft and publish academic work accompanying the Principles jointly and in co-authorship with the Principal Investigators or with the European Principal Investigator (Univ-Prof Dr Christiane Wendehorst, LL.M). There will be opportunity for independent scientific work (eg a habilitation thesis), ideally in the thematic area of the project.
